
I AM THE LIVING BREAD THAT CAME DOWN FROM HEAVEN



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PREPARE

Each Sunday we are called to "keep holy the Sabbath." Although that may look different right now, we will still come together as an Our Lady of Hope family through the gift of technology.

We hope that this guide helps you reclaim Sundays as a day of rest. The Lord invites us to stop our work and our worrying, and instead find rest and be renewed in Him. In modern culture, Sunday has become a day to "catch up" on everything that didn't get done during the week, and any time left over is often seen as an opportunity to "get ahead" for next week. But we've been given the opportunity to remember what Sunday is really about. During this pandemic, the Lord is calling us back to Himself, offering us a chance to reclaim the gift of the Sabbath in our homes and in our families.

A basic principle for observing the Sabbath is to only do things that can be considered "rest" or "worship." Below are a few ideas to consider. Maybe pick just one thing to focus on this Sunday, then next Sunday keep that practice in addition to a second one. And then the next Sunday add a third, to slowly over time begin to enter into this great gift of the Sabbath more and more.

KEEP THE LORD AT THE CENTER Read the Mass readings ahead of time, participate in Mass, make more time for prayer, spend some extra time in silence focusing on the Lord.

TRY NOT TO WORK Resist the urge to check your email, or catch up on a few things, and leave it for Monday.

PLAN AHEAD Take care of what needs to be done before Sunday, so plan the rest of your week to make sure you get the laundry done, have gone grocery shopping, etc. so you don't have to do any of it on Sunday.

SPEND THE DAY "SCREEN FREE" Try to stay off social media, internet news, and your phone as much as possible. If you can't make it the whole day try to go for at least a few hours.

BE INTENTIONAL WITH OTHERS If you live with others (ie. family, roommates), is there something you can do together like play a game or go on a hike? If you live alone, can you reach out to a good friend and catch up?

LEISURE, NOT ENTERTAINMENT Try to do things that are life giving; bingewatching a favorite show or playing video games for hours rarely leaves anyone with a new zeal for life. Read a good book, go on a long walk, develop a hobby.

Be our defense against the wickedness and snares of the Devil.



Bread of Life Discourse

PROCESS

The gospel for Corpus Christi proclaims loudly the Real Presence of Christ at Mass. Miraculously, though bread and wine seem to be seen, somehow and mysteriously Our Lord is truly present: "For my flesh is meat indeed: and my blood is drink indeed" (John 6:56). In this discourse to the crowd, He gives His most astounding claim: the Presence of God – the Glory of the Lord – is no longer to be found in the Temple only, nor is it lost due to sin, but God has returned as the manna in the desert, broken and given for His people to have eternal life. He is here. Now. In every church and chapel, waiting for us.

For Reflection

The Real Presence is not abstract or symbolic. Our Lord makes no effort to moderate His language when the crowd does not accept this "hard saying" (6:60). He lets them go. His disciples only are left to say they will not leave, and confess, as St. Peter does, "Lord, to whom shall we go? thou hast the words of eternal life" (6:69). His words later at the Last Supper fulfill this earlier promise: "Take ye, and eat. This is my body" (Mt 26:26). His last words at the Ascension confirm it: "I am with you all days, even to the consummation of the world" (28:20). Not a mere symbol, nor my presence in some ethereal way, but really here. That is what makes churches special, different even from the beauties of nature. He is not merely here through His creation of Beauty and Truth, but here much more deeply, bodily. Because He said He would be, for love of us.

It is astounding every time I think of it, perhaps because I am a convert and did not grow up with the Mass and the Eucharist, that God every day obeys the words of a mere man, takes on the appearance of a bit of bread and a drop of wine, and subjects Himself by doing so to the whims of our physical world. What would He not do to teach us to be humble! As I write these words in the rectory, He is below the floorboards of this room in the chapel. The Real Presence begins to astound if it is given even a rudimentary amount of thought. Do not say, "God is here," but "God is here."

Now that most of us are able to get to Mass again (thanks be to God!), it would be very helpful to renew the fire in our hearts for God in the Blessed Sacrament. Time with the Blessed Sacrament is like incense burned up – productively useless but pleasing to God and helpful to us. Our Lord longs for us to "waste time" with Him.

How often do we really appreciate His Presence? Do we come into church without thinking, or do we see Him in the tabernacle and immediately thank Him for His loving presence? This is what makes our genuflections acts of reverence instead of empty gestures. If we truly believe the God is really present, how could we not fall down and worship Him?

PRACTICE



Questions for Reflection

Do I believe that Jesus is truly present in the Eucharist?

When I receive Our Lord in the Eucharist, have I confessed all my mortal sins? Have I kept the fast for at least an hour before?

After I receive communion, do I spend at least a few minutes giving thanks to Jesus for coming to be with me? Do I take a moment to quietly accept and return His love for me?

Do I spend time in prayer as often as I am able with the Blessed Sacrament? Do I want to grow in my desire to spend time with Him?

Challenge: Spend at least 30 minutes in prayer before Jesus in the Eucharist this week. As Seminarian James says in his reflection, "Our Lord longs for us to 'waste time' with Him." He is always present to us in the tabernacle, but we have the opportunity to worship in an even more special way on Thursdays, when Jesus is exposed in the monstrance for Eucharist Adoration.
