- f. Freedom is life in Christ/the Spirit and is opposed to the slavery of sin which works through the flesh (8:1-11)
- g. Glorification: The Spirit, Sonship, and Suffering (8:12-39)
 - i. Baptism is our adoption as children of God/Abba in the Spirit (8:12-17)
 - ii. The Spirit helps us live in this world of creation waiting for its final redemption when we will have the image of Christ (8:18-30)
 - iii. Nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ (8:31-39)
